
Coordinating Council on Access and Mobility (CCAM) Program Inventory

Although SSA reported that no programs may fund human services transportation, coordination opportunities were explored. NCD does not fund grant programs.





CCAM Program Inventory: Benefits to Grantees

The inventory provides several benefits to state and local CCAM grantees. Specifically, the inventory:

Allows state and local partners to **find detailed information in one centralized location** on existing Federal agency programs that may fund transportation

Maps out what types of transportation activities programs may fund, which may help state and local partners **identify transportation collaboration opportunities and expand transportation service**

Federal Fund Braiding Guide

The <u>CCAM Federal Fund Braiding Guide</u> is a CCAM resource that clarifies acceptable Federal fund braiding for local match opportunities.

Federal fund braiding for local match is when Federal funds from one grant program are used to fulfill the local match requirement of another Federal grant.

Section 5307, 5310, and 5311: Using Non-DOT Federal Funds for Local Match



In order to participate in Federal fund braiding, a project **must meet all requirements** of the participating Federal agencies, including eligibility requirements, reporting requirements, regulatory requirements, statutory requirements, and program guidance.



New FTA Coordination Guidance

In March 2022, FTA published <u>Transportation Coordination</u> <u>Guidance</u> that aims to reduce overlap between the <u>130 CCAM</u> programs that may fund transportation and incentivize collaboration by clarifying eligible reporting into the <u>National Transit Database</u>. Topics addressed:

- Definition of public transportation
- Paratransit
- Charter service
- Incidental use of transit assets
- Trip brokering

New FTA Coordination Guidance, Cont.

What is the Charter Rule exception for QHSO?

There is a Charter Rule exception for QHSOs that (1) are registered on the FTA website (updated biennially) or (2) receive funding from one of the sources listed in Appendix A - Federal Programs Providing Transportation Assistance. Recipients of FTA funds may provide service to clients of a QHSO without violating the Charter Rule, but trips not open to the public or to a segment of the public defined by age, disability, or low-income status, are not reportable to NTD.

When are QHSO trips reportable to NTD?

QHSO trips are reportable to NTD when they meet the criteria of sponsored service (sponsored unlinked passenger trips) as described in the NTD reporting manual. FTA considers these trips to be public transportation if they are part of a coordinated human services public transportation plan and there is an attempt to share rides (see 'shared-ride' section above), either with clients of other QHSOs or the general public. Local areas develop coordinated plans to identify transportation needs and assist individuals with disabilities, older adults, and people with low incomes. Incidental Use Example


Vehicle Sharing

A van, purchased with FTA funding, is currently operated by ABC Nonprofit Organization, a sub-recipient to the State DOT. ABC operates Monday – Friday (M-F). The local CCAM program grantee (e.g. CDC Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) Program, etc.) uses the vehicle on weekends to take their low-income participants to everyday destinations, such as access to healthy food and recreation opportunities. The vehicle sharing arrangement may vary from free to reimbursement to the transit agency for the fully allocated cost of using the vehicle.

FTA-Funded National TA Center Community Grant Programs: Incentivizing Transportation Partnerships to Improve Social Determinates of Health

National Rural Transit Assistance Program (National RTAP) Community Rides Grant Program

offers current recipients and sub-recipients of FTA's Formula Grants for Rural Areas (Section 5311) and Tribal Transit Program the opportunity to apply for grant awards of up to \$100,000 for projects that develop or strengthen transportation partnerships that improve social determinants of health in rural and tribal communities. Projects will improve access to critical needs like healthcare, healthy food, or social services, as well as build the capacity of transit programs. The results of the projects will be shared nationally as promising practices. National RTAP selected 19 projects.

National Aging and Disability Transportation Center (NADTC) community grants are designed to support communities to assess their transportation needs and develop and implement innovative new models for increasing the availability of accessible transportation services for older adults and people with disabilities, including making effective use of the FTA Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program (Section 5310) funds.

National Center for Mobility Management (NCMM) community grants are designed to support communities to pursue, facilitate, and encourage partnerships between transportation agencies and organizations that provide health-related, social, and community services to low-income individuals and families, with the goal of enhancing transportation options for all through coordination and mobility management practices and strategic partnerships.

 - No single law or statute created these programs, therefore no uniform requirements on program administration or delivery exists, and each program maintains its own regulations, eligibility requirements, and operating procedures. Thus, there is duplication across Federal programs in services funded.
